**L**No, I don't. (--Do you buy anything in bulk? / How often do you go food shopping? / Do you buy shampoo and soap one at a time?)

## *More information* Where is oatmeal?

After the coronavirus outbreak began in February, certain household staples disappeared from stores. It began with panic buying of toilet and tissue paper. Other items that were in short supply at one time or other, in response to rumor or sudden popularity, were natto, instant ramen noodles, spaghetti, pancake mix, and flour for home baking.

Another food has gradually been getting scarcer on grocery store shelves: oatmeal. Oats are a cereal plant that is similar to rice and wheat. Oats are rich in diet fiber, vitamin B1, iron and other minerals. Oatmeal is coarsely ground oats. Nippon Food Manufacturing (Nisshoku/日本 食品製造), a company that sells oatmeal, says it can be eaten like "okayu" rice porridge, so some of its customers buy it instead of rice. Others use oatmeal for baby food. Some athletes, including bodybuilders and people who are trying to lose weight, eat oatmeal as a staple food, and so they buy it in bulk.

After the state of emergency was declared, oatmeal sales spiked unexpectedly. Nisshoku says that it expects its oatmeal products to be back in stores by the end of June. (188 words)
