Just like "unagi" eel

This year, the "Doyo no Ushi ni Hi" (Days of the Ox) are July 21st and August 2nd. On those days, we eat "unagi" eel to fight the summer heat. "Unajiro" is "kamaboko" fish cake that looks and tastes like grilled eel. A package (361 yen) has thick sauce and "sansho" Japanese pepper spice. Heat Unajiro in a microwave oven for one minute, and put it on top of rice. This summer there are two special versions: "Unaru Oishisa Unajiro" (Unajiro so delicious that you say wow / 361 yen) and "Sugoku Nagai Unajiro" (Really Long Unajiro / 498 yen).

Have you ever eaten Ichimasa Kamaboko's Unajiro?

LYes, I have. (--When did you eat it? / Did it really taste like "unagi no kabayaki" grilled eel? / Do you want to eat it on July 21 or August 2 this summer?)

LeNo, I haven't. (--Do you want to try it? / Do you like grilled eel? / Are you going to eat grilled eel on Doyo Ushi no Hi this summer?)

Have you eaten a grilled "ayu" sweetfish this summer yet?

LYes, I have. (--Where did you eat it? / How was it? / Have you eaten "katsuo" bonito this summer yet?)

Leno, I haven't. (--Do you like "tansuigyo" freshwater fish? / Have you ever eaten "namazu" catfish? / Have you ever eaten "dojou" loaches or "koi" carp?)

Do you lose your "shokuyoku" appetite in summer?

LYes, I do. / Kind of. (--Do you lose weight in summer? / What do you eat when you lose your appetite in summer?)

No, I don't. (--What's your favorite summer food? / When you're very tired, do you lose your appetite?)

Just like "unagi" eel

According to the old calendar, July brings the "Doyo" period before summer. This year there are two "Doyo no Ushi ni Hi" Days of the Ox--July 21 and August 2--when "unagi" eel is traditionally eaten to give us stamina against the heat. Earlier this year, the catch of domestic baby eels was much better than expected, so prices might be lower than usual. However, domestic eels are on the endangered species list. This has encouraged the development of sustainable alternatives.

"Unajiro" is a "kamaboko" fish cake product from Ichimasa Kamaboko (一正蒲鉾). It looks and tastes similar to grilled eel, and it's even rich in vitamin B1 like the real thing. A package of two fillets (¥361) includes a sachet of thick sauce, and another of ground "sansho" Japanese pepper spice. Heat Unajiro in a microwave oven for one minute, and it's ready to be put on top of a bowl of rice.

This summer Ichimasa Kamaboko has two special versions of Unajiro: "Unaru Oishisa Unajiro" (Unajiro so delicious that you say wow / ¥361) and "Sugoku Nagai Unajiro" (Really Long Unajiro / ¥498).
