You can write with a black pen on white paper, or with a white pen on black paper. Now Kokuyo has made a notebook with gray paper. You can write in it with both black and white ink pens. This new notebook is also an unusual size. When you open it, two pages have a 16:10 size, which is the same as a computer screen. Each page also has lines from side to side and up and down to make writing and drawing easier. The 50-page notebooks went on sale on June 25th at Kokuyo's online store <<u>https://www.kokuyo-shop.jp/shop/</u>> for 900 yen. (105 words)

You can write with a black pen on white paper, or with a white pen on black paper. If paper is gray, however, you can write on it with both black and white ink pens. Kokuyo, the stationary company, has made a gray-paper notebook for this reason. A quirk of human eyesight is that it's hard to see dark and bright colors at the same time. Kokuyo says its new notebook can be useful for brainstorming and developing ideas because of the contrast of black and white on the gray background.

It's not only paper color that makes this notebook different. It is also an original size. Each page is a slightly wider version of A5. When you open the notebook, a twopage spread has a 16:10 aspect ratio, which is the same as most laptop computer screens. Each page is printed with a faint grid pattern similar to graph paper, to make writing and drawing easier.

The 50-page notebooks went on sale on June 25 at Kokuyo's online store <<u>https://www.kokuyo-</u> <u>shop.jp/shop/</u>> for ¥900. They sold out immediately, and are expected to be back in stock in the middle of August.

More information The next big thing: lemonade?

Tapioca bubble tea is still a fad, but people are already looking for the next big thing. Some businesses are betting that it's lemonade. A classic lemonade drink has three ingredients: sugar, water and lemon juice. This summer, novel versions are popping up everywhere.

Here are some examples. *Lemonica* first opened in Kanazawa, Ishikawa Prefecture in 2017 (Heisei 29). There are currently over 30 Lemonica lemonade parlors in various parts of the country, with the most famous one on the first floor of the Shibuya Fukuras Mall in Tokyo. Craft your personal lemonade by choosing cold, hot, or sparkling water, sweetness level, and additional flavoring (¥340 a cup). *Wow Wow Lemonade* is a Hawaiian lemonade stand. Its lemonade trucks visit shopping malls, where they serve drinks in plastic cups or mason jars (¥450). *Litt Up Kyoto* is a café in Higashiyama, Kyoto. Its purple "Liberte Lemonade" is served in a hexagonal bottle (¥950).

You can also do it yourself. Kaldi Coffee Farm, the imported food and drink store, sells cartons of "Lemonade Base" (¥398). Take it home and dilute it with water or sparkling water.
